

Bernadette Brown to Speak About "Issues Facing the LGBT Communities in 2010"

Bernadette Brown will speak at the Perceptions General Membership Meeting on Thursday, February 18 at 7:00 pm at St. John's Episcopal Church in Saginaw. Bernadette was born and raised in Detroit and joined the <u>Triangle Foundation</u> as the Director of Policy in August 2008. She received her Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology from Columbia University, graduating on the Dean's List and was a two-time recipient of the Robert A. Quittmeyer Scholar Award. While at Columbia, she collaborated with a nurse-midwife on the creation of a



postpartum support program for low income women in Harlem, NY and completed a fellowship at Latino Family Services in Detroit, where she worked as a youth counselor.

Bernadette received her Juris Doctorate from Boston University School of Law, and was an Edward F. Hennessey Scholar. While in law school, Bernadette was a Student Advocate for Ending Domestic Violence and a member of Outlaw, BUSL's LGBT student organization. She completed an internship with Judy Norsigian at the Boston Women's Health Book Collective, where she researched legislation on reproductive cloning and pharmaceutical direct-to-consumer advertising. She worked with Massachusetts Representative Kathleen Teahan and drafted legislation to protect a parent's right to refuse to administer ADHD medications to his/her child. At law school, Bernadette was one of the lucky few people allowed admittance to the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court to witness the oral argument in the landmark case that legalized same-sex marriage in Massachusetts, Goodridge v. Department of Public Health. Bernadette became a public defender with the Neighborhood Defender Service of Harlem, and was an attorney in the Litigation Department at the prestigious law firm of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison, LLP, in New York City. THIS DOUG'S LIFE

"Articulating My Thoughts" PART I

On Sunday, October 26, 2008, I gave a speech to PFLAG at the UU church in Midland. I was asked to speak about my life as a gay senior. (I was 74.) At first, I didn't know where to start. Should I tell of Don and our experiences when we were together? About how I felt after his death? What it's like to be gay in a straight world? Then I remembered what I said to a close friend with a similar question. I told him, "Give your speech chronologically." So here goes.

When we were born, my twin and I weighed only 3 lbs. and 2 lbs. respectively. We were born at home and Ma had a helper from the old country (Poland), named Lena Washoleski. At first, neither he nor I would nurse and Ma was afraid that we might starve to death. Lena told her to give us a highly weakened solution of whiskey and water to sharpen our appetites. It worked and for the first time in a week, or so I was told, we slept. But not without some concern on Ma's part. Because Thomas and I were so small, Ma had us in bed with her for body warmth. That night she woke up screaming, "They're dead!" Lena came in and said, "Let me look at them. Hell, they're not dead. They're asleep!"

So began the first days of my life.

Pa would come home after working a 16-hour day in his grocery store. Back in the late 30's and early 40's, you worked long days if you expected to succeed. He would make a lot of noise coming home and Ma would say, "Leo, be quiet. You'll wake up the kids." He did quiet down but by then the 'damage' was done. Thom and I were up and in the kitchen. Pa would have us sit down at the kitchen table, give us a small cheese spread, a glass of beer, some pickled bologna, cheddar cheese and crackers it was wonderful!

Later, when I was in grade school, I began drinking an average of 2 beers a week. Pa always had beer in the refrigerator and let his 5 sons have some anytime they wanted. By the time I reached high school, I was up to 48 bottles of beer a week.

You are probably wondering why I've brought up my alcoholism. It wasn't until I was to give my speech that I realized that I had been in denial about my sexuality. All through my formative years I was attracted to boys. Being raised in a Catholic family where these kinds of thoughts were considered sinful, I found it easier to be at peace with myself knowing I could relax with booze.

One day my mother said about Thom and me, "Boy, are you boys queer!" I thought, "Oh my God, she knows." I found out the use of "queer" then meant different, not homosexual.

My drinking continued to escalate until I was drinking a 5th of whiskey, a 5th of wine and a 6 pack of 16 ounce bottles of beer a day. To add to my problem, I worked in my brother's liquor store. He was also an alcoholic. (He died from a massive coronary arrest at age 69.) I had access to all the booze I could want while working in his store.

My drinking continued to grow until one day I experienced delirium tremors, or D.T.s. Eventually, I saw a Psychiatrist, about my drinking problem, not my sexuality. On that subject, he was not helpful at all. But curiously, he explained why I have no ability for time reference. To me, something that happened 15 years ago might just as well have happened yesterday. And, something that took place yesterday seems to have taken place at an earlier time.

It turned out he was a Neural Psychiatrist. He explained that the small amounts of whiskey I was given as an infant and my equally small premature size (I was one month early) caused the engrams (that part of the brain that stores thoughts) to burn out.

Later, I admitted myself to St. Luke's Hospital Ward A for alcoholics for 10 days. That didn't help a whole lot either. Finally, I entered A.A. where I remained for 5 years. By then, I was in my early 30's

It was there that I met Don Murray. I rented a room in his mobile home. After a few months, he told me, "There are people who can live alone and be perfectly happy, and there are those who need someone in their lives. You need someone." Although he and I did not stay together, that thought stayed with me.

Shortly after that I bought a mobile home of my own.

To this day, I don't remember how I came to be sent to Don's house in Midland. For want of a better

explanation, I chalk it up to a form of an alcoholic black out. I spent the night and upon leaving for work the next morning, I saw him standing in the doorway. The look on his face can only be described as wonderful. He was 25 and I was 34. I decided there and then that he was the man I wanted to spend the rest of my life with. He was kind, gentle and genuine. I pursued him relentlessly. We moved into my mobile home shortly after that and were together for the next 36 years.

Our life was sort of mundane. Not a whole lot happened. We never went to a movie, restaurant, or the theater. He was an LPN (Licensed Practical Nurse). I worked at Giant Super Market in Mt. Pleasant. One day, when I came home, he was there when he should have been at work. He told me he'd quit. Without so much as a hiccup, I took on the role of the "bread winner" and he the

"home maker." Eventually we moved to where I live now. We opened an Antique Shop. It was there that Don blossomed. An inveterate reader with great recall, he did the research, pricing, and furniture stripping and refinishing. We had 535 reference books. He knew where to find almost anything in all of them. Me? I would take hours to find something.

When we visited my mother she would call me Don and him Doug. We would correct her and she'd say, "What difference does it make. You're like two peas in a pod."

The essay is worth 50% of their total score.

The scholarship committee is looking for volunteers to score the applications. If you'd be willing to volunteer to read the essays and score the applications, please contact <u>Tim@PerceptionsSV.org</u>. Volunteers must sign an affidavit that they do not have a conflict of interest due to a relationship with any of the applicants.

This year, we will award at least \$1,000 in scholarships. As of this writing, the exact amount has not been determined and depends on the income that our endowment fund earns. We may be able to award scholarships to two individuals. Our awards were \$500 each of the first two years.

A Little Bit About Randy Hasso

If you already know Randy Hasso, you know that he will bring a great deal of personal and professional experience to the Perceptions board. From working on his family farm as a child, to his three years in the Peace Corps, to owning his own party store, Randy has had a full life. Now he plans to continue his service to the LGBT community by serving as one of two new board members who were elected this January.

Randy's father was a commercial fisherman in the sixties, and he remembers helping him make fishing nets growing up. He helped plant Christmas trees on the farm every Easter and sold them in Pinconning and Bay City every Fall. He also worked summers picking pickles along side migrant workers to earn money that paid for his education at MSU, where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Horticulture.

Next came the Peace Corps, where he spent almost three years in Tunisia, North Africa. Randy says that he "started a class at a school in Bizerte, Tunisia for handicapped children. I taught them how to plant and maintain a garden, raise rabbits and build hutches for them, raise chickens for meat and eggs. I also learned the Arabic language, Tunisian dialect while living in the Sahara desert, no one spoke English."

Randy went on to own the Short Stop Depot party store for 20 years, where he learned to do payroll, hiring, ordering and many other things. Three years at Walmart followed. He was also quite active in Dignity, a local LGBT group that was around in the eighties. He continues to serve the LGBT community by volunteering for the things like the AIDS Walk, Highway Cleanup, and Pride Banquet. Perceptions is lucky to have him on the board.
