



# Pride Awards Winners Announced

On June 28th, the 3rd Annual LGBT & Allies Pride Awards Banquet honored people and businesses for their work toward equality for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people. The 2011 awards and recipients were:

**Lifetime Achievement Award – John Monahan** (1946-2002) (formerly of Saginaw), first openlygay community activist in the Tri-Cities;

**Business Award** – <u>Magic Bean Café</u> (Saginaw) for contributions and for being a welcoming venue;

**Pride Awards: Bill Giorgis** (Saginaw) - for philanthropy to improve LGBT lives and the community at large;

**Bob and Denise Malosh** (Midland) for parental support and for leadership of Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG Tri-Cities);

**Randy Hasso** (Saginaw) - for being a longtime volunteer in Tri-City LGBT and HIV/AIDS organizations;

Rev. Kathy VanBuskirk (Saginaw) — for community activism and organizing the first local LGBT Pride festival. No nominations were received for the Political Award. Photos and coverage of the event were not possible before we went to press but will appear next month.

### Trevor Project Features 24 Hour Hotline

In 1998, HBO was scheduled to air the 1994 Academy Award winning short film Trevor, about a gay 13 year old boy who attempts to end his life. The films writer James Lecesne, its director/ producer Peggy Rajski and its producer Randy Stone began searching for an appropriate support line to advertise during the broadcast, for anyone experiencing the same feelings as Trevor. When they could find none, the three dedicated themselves to creating one, and the Trevor Project was born. The Trevor Lifeline is the only nationwide aroundthe-clock crisis and suicide prevention line for gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and questioning youth.



Stigma of Being LGB Can Lead to Increased Health Risk-Taking: The stigma of being gay, lesbian, or bisexual, along with related discrimination and victimization, can lead LGB teens to engage more frequently in risky behaviors than their heterosexual peers, an extensive report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) finds, after surveying 156,000 high school students from 2001 - 2009. On average, LGB teens are more likely to use tobacco, drugs, or alcohol, contemplate suicide, or carry a gun, than straight teens, often due to increased stress they experience from society about their sexual orientation. "This report should be a wake-up call for families, schools and communities that we need to do a much better job of supporting these young people. Any effort to promote adolescent health and safety must take into account the additional stressors these youth experience because of their sexual orientation, such as stigma, discrimination, and victimization," said Howell Wechsler, Ed.D, M.P.H, director of CDC's Division of Adolescent and School Health (DASH). Gender Identity Disorder Classification for Transgender Individuals

Being Reassessed: For decades, the diagnosis of Gender Identity Disorder (GID) in The Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM) has drawn protest from the trans community, their allies and supportive medical and mental health professionals for its depiction of gender diversity, gender transition and medical transition care as mental illness and sexual deviance. However, many community advocates

and supportive medical professionals agree that some kind of diagnostic coding is necessary to facilitate access to medical and/ or surgical transition care for those trans and transsexual people who need it. There is a need to replace the GID category with one that is consistent with transition care, for those who need it, rather than contradicting transition care. The American Psychiatric Association has been requesting public input on its newest proposed revisions to the GID category for the Fifth Edition of the DSM. The Sexual and Gender Identity Disorders Workgroup of the APA's DSM-5 Task Force has partially responded to concerns about the GID diagnosis in the fifth edition of The Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders. For example, the derogatory title of "Gender Identity Disorder" (intended to imply "disordered" gender identity) has been replaced with "Gender Dysphoria," with dysphoria meaning distress. DSM-5 authors have expressed a desire to focus on distress with incongruent physical characteristics and assigned gender roles rather difference. Source: on www.bilerico.com

Wyoming Supreme Court Rules
That Same-Sex Marriage Not
"Contrary to the Laws of Nature":

On June 6th, the Wyoming Supreme Court unanimously reversed a district court ruling that prevented a same-sex couple from obtaining a divorce in Niobrara County. The ruling means that the state's courts now have jurisdiction to grant divorces to same-sex couples who were legally married elsewhere. The opinion specifies three different types of marriages: legal marriages between a man and a woman that are recognized by the state of Wyoming, marriages that the state does not recognize but are common in other states (like common law marriages) and a third form of marriage that is "deemed contrary to the law of nature." Significantly, the Court found that same-sex marriage fit into the second category (not the third) and likened them to common law marriages which, while not recognized by the state, can be dissolved within it. Full Repeal of Don't Ask, Don't **Tell May Be Close:** Defense Secretary Robert Gates says he sees no roadblocks to repeal of the ban on gay military members serving openly. He says if the military chiefs make their recommendation to move forward on the repeal before the end of the month, he will sign it, which would make it effective as early as September. He says the training has gone well and people have been "pleasantly surprised" at the lack of pushback from the troops. More than a million U.S. troops have been trained on the new law that repealed the 17-year-old ban on gays serving openly in the armed services. Gates says the most common questions deal with housing, and commanders are developing ways to deal with that. Source: www.huffingtonpost.com

**UN Group Backs Gay Rights for the** First Time: The United Nations endorsed the rights of gay, lesbian and transgender people for the first time ever June 17th, passing a resolution hailed as historic by the U.S. and other backers and decried by African and Islamic countries. The declaration was cautiously worded, expressing "grave concern" about abuses suffered by people because of their sexual orientation, and commissioning a global report on discrimination of gays. But activists called it a remarkable shift on an issue that has divided the global body for decades, and credited the Obama administration's push for gay rights at home and abroad with helping win support for the resolution. "This represents a historic moment to highlight the human rights abuses and violations that lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people face around the world based solely on who they are and whom they love," U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said in a statement.
